**WHEREAS**, the Texas Department of Transportation has performed traffic/speed studies and has requested these changes to the speed limit zones on FM 3320 (Golf Course Road) within the city limits;

**WHEREAS**, this Ordinance is necessary to protect the public safety, health, and welfare of the City of Kingsville.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF KINGSVILLE, TEXAS:

Ι.

**THAT** Schedule I of Article 5: Traffic Schedules of Chapter VII, Traffic Code, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Kingsville, Texas, shall be amended to read as follows:

### § 7-5 SCHEDULE I: SPEED LIMITS.

(I) Farm to Market 3320 (Golf Course Road).

SUBJECT: Reduce the speed limit on FM 3320/Golf Course Road from FM 425/Carlos Truan

Blvd. to FM 2090 (southern city limit on that road)

### SUMMARY

This item allows the City to approve an ordinance to establish the speed limits on FM 3320/Golf Course Road from FM 425/Carlos Truan Blvd. to General Cavazos Blvd. from 50 mph to 40 mph and on FM 3320/Golf Course Road from General Cavazos Blvd. to FM 2090 from 60 mph to 55 mph.

### **BACKGROUND**

The Engineering Department received a request on November 4, 2013 from the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) to pass an ordinance establishing new speed limits on FM 3320 (Golf Course Road) From FM 425 (Carlos Truan Blvd.) to General Cavazos Blvd. from 50 mph to 40 mph and from General Cavazos Blvd. to FM 2090 from 60 mph to 55 mph. The request is based on a performed a speed study performed by TXDOT in the spring of 2013 on FM 3320 (Golf Course Road). The study showed the 85th percentile of traffic to be at 40 mph and 55 mph respectively.

### RECOMMENDATION

Given the current development and the traffic studies in this area, staff recommends an ordinance be passed to establish the speed limits on FM 3320/Golf Course Road from FM 425 (Carlos Truan Blvd.) to General Cavazos Blvd. at 40 mph and from General Cavazos Blvd. to FM 2090 at 55 mph.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT

No financial impact to the City of Kingsville. Establishing this ordinance is in accordance with state and federal guidelines and the Manual of Uniformed Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD). TXDOT will pay for and install the new speed limit signs.

Attached is a copy of a speed zone strip map for Farm to Market 3320 that runs through the City Limits of Kingsville. We have concluded the speed zone study from North city limit of Kingsville (FM 425) to FM 1717. As a result of our study, we are proposing to decrease the existing speed limit (within city limits) from 50mph to 40 mph (from FM 425 To General Cavazos). We also propose to decrease the existing speed from General Cavazos to FM 1717 from 60mph to 55 mph (outside city limits).

If our proposal is satisfactory, please secure city action and return two copies of the City Ordinance to our office. We will then update the speed limit signs on FM 3320.





AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF 2.767 ACRES OF LAND AT 2000 NORTH ARMSTRONG FOR A NEW WATER WELL (WELL #25); PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION.

**WHEREAS**, the City Commission previously designated funds for the purchase of land on which to build a new water well (well #25);

**WHEREAS**, staff has been working with the hydrologist to locate a suitable site for the new water well, has located a site, and has negotiated a proposed agreement with the land owner for the acquisition of the land; and

WHEREAS, the parties propose to purchase 2.767 acres of land from Manuel Ugues on a tract of land located at 2000 North Armstrong, Kingsville, Texas for \$48,825.00 and for inkind services in the form of an irrigation water meter (\$265 estimated value), a driveway (\$1,500 estimated value) and 100 tons of reclaimed road material (\$3,500 estimated value); and

**WHEREAS**, the City Commission has determined that this acquisition would best serve public health, necessity, and convenience and the general welfare of the City of Kingsville and its citizens.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF KINGSVILLE, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1.** That staff is authorized to purchase 2.7 acres of land from Manuel Ugues on a tract of land located at 2000 North Armstrong, Kingsville, Texas, as more specifically described on the survey attached as "Exhibit A", which is made a part of this ordinance.

**SECTION 2.** That staff is authorized to purchase the land for \$48,825.00 and for in-kind services in the form of an irrigation water meter (\$265 estimated value), a driveway (\$1,500 estimated value), and 100 tons of reclaimed road material (\$3,500 estimated value).

**SECTION 3.** The City Manager is authorized, as an act of the City of Kingsville, to execute any and all documents necessary to complete this land acquisition.

**SECTION 4.** That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

**SECTION 5.** That publication shall be made in the official publication of the City of Kingsville as required by the City Charter of the City of Kingsville. Codification is not required.



### **SUMMARY**

This item authorizes the purchase of 2.7 acres of land for proposed Water Well #25.

### **BACKGROUND**

Engineering and Public Works have been working to acquire a location suitable for a proposed Water Well #25. It has been difficult to find a location where adequate existing utilities are located. We have been in contact with several property owners toward the north side of the city and have located a property that meets the requirements for a potential new well location. Manuel Ugues owns a tract of land at 2000 N. Armstrong. This land is adjacent to the north side of Tranquitas Creek and the east side of N. Armstrong with access from N. Armstrong. This land is a good location with connection ability to a new 8" pvc waterline running parallel on the east side of N. Armstrong. During negotiations in addition to the land purchase price (\$48,825.00), Mr. Ugues requested in-kind services from the City in the form of an irrigation water meter (\$265), a driveway (\$1,500) and 100 tons of reclaimed road material (\$3,500) on the remaining 3 acres. The hydrologist, Joe Vickers, believes this location to be a good site for water production.

3. The Kingsville Boxing Club (a federally recognized 501(c) (3) Non Profit Organization) is applying for a grant to help and assist the club with its program. The club was formed with the intent of offering our youth an alternative from the streets. The club has grown considerable since its organization back in 1997. Currently the club allows all members of this community to attend and utilize its facilities with the purpose of getting fit and staying healthy. Members of the Kingsville Boxing Club who are registered with USA boxing are required to attend various classes throughout the year that teach and lecture on subjects such as; Drug and Alcohol Abuse, Dealing with Teen Pressure, Building one's Self Esteem, Nutrition and The United States Anti Doping Agency policy on drug use. Our instructor for those classes is a licensed and registered drug and alcohol counselor for the state of Texas. Speakers are invited to come in and share their experience with our athletes to help them better understand the consequences of abusing drugs and alcohol as well as giving motivational speeches to help our participants succeed. Pamphlets are located on site in the gym and are used to help educate our athletes in these various areas.

Our club is a very unique program that offers so many different types of character building programs (See List of Additional Programs). Our program has not only impacted the "At Risk" student but has also impacted those who want to volunteer and make a difference in our community.

Our club currently has no major sponsor and relies solely on the support of our community and organizations such as yours to continue our existence. The average cost per year to operate our club is \$15,000.00 (last 5 years).

We are requesting that a \$5,000.00 grant be awarded to our program to be used in the following manner:

- 1. Money will be used to help our program continue to spread our Drug Free Message to members of our community (primarily our youth).
- 2. A portion of this grant will be used to purchase additional equipment needed to ensure that all participants are properly equipped to conduct their physical training.
- 3. All money will be used to directly impact our program. Our program has no paid staff and all money will be used to help operate our program.

Approval of this grant is very important to our program. Without your organizations support, this program could not function in the manner that it has. Our program has received high praise from community leaders and members of our community. In addition, leaders from different communities have stated that they are very impressed with our program and believe that our community is fortunate to have a program like ours. - Drug, Alcohol and Substance abuse education Twice a month, a certified Drug and Alcohol Abuse Counselor conducts classes for all individuals.
- Drug Awareness Information Give Away The Kingsville Boxing Club gives away for free, Educational Activity books and other items that focus on Drug Awareness and City Leadership.
- Anti-Bullying Campaign This past year, the boxing club initiated our Anti-Bullying Campaign by handing out activity books, book markers and other items that talk about bullying. In addition, pamphlets about Sexting are also given out.
- Knock Out HomeWork/Tutoring Program Once a week (Wednesdays) the Kingsville Boxing Club opens its doors and allows students from throughout the community to come in and get assistance with their homework or for tutoring. Additional days are made available at the students' request. (Most volunteers and tutors are from our local University)
- Camp of Champs This program was established in 2008 and is a cost free camp that is geared towards children ages 8-14 and focuses on the importance of health, fitness, discipline and faith. (The same type of training is given on a daily basis and if there aren't enough participants, the program is run during normal training hours).
- Training Facility Our facility has opened its doors to Law Enforcement Personnel as well as Military Personnel to use as a fitness center or an instructional facility.

SUBJECT : Local Border Security Program (LBSP-14)

The Local Border Security Program FY2014 (LBSP-14), hereinafter referred to as LBSP-14 for fiscal year ending August 31, 2014 to provide additional manpower by local law enforcement agencies for state led border security enhanced operations for improved border security. Using these funds, the Texas Department of Public Safety provides grants to local law enforcement agencies for payment of overtime and operational costs for local law enforcement officers (commissioned peace officers).

The Texas Legislature has appropriated funds for **overtime and operational costs** for increased patrol and investigative capacity for certified peace officers. It further directed that the Department of Public Safety's Overtime Policy should be used to define overtime. Certain operational costs incurred as part of these overtime patrols and investigations, such as fuel/mileage and additional cost for minor emergency repairs may also be funded.

#### The LBSP-14 is a reimbursement program of actual costs for eligible activities.

The State of Texas has an urgent security challenge caused by the increased threat from organized crime, terrorism, and their allies that is exacerbated by the continued flow of illegal immigrants. These security challenges require a unified strategy to provide the State of Texas with a framework to respond. These threats will continue to threaten the security of Texas and the United States for the foreseeable future. Organized criminal, drug trafficking, and illegal immigration activities originating and transiting from Mexico to the United States and Texas will continue until the air, land, and sea transit areas are secured. These criminal elements also use these air, land, and sea transit areas and routes from the United States and Texas to Mexico for the movement of funds, weapons, and stolen vehicles.

Criminal activities, including drugs and human smuggling, are extensive in the border regions and within the transportation corridors from the borders to major metropolitan areas. Relatively small groups of substantially financed illegal immigrants or potential terrorist often can infiltrate the United States and adversely impact population centers, critical infrastructure, and citizens.

The State of Texas will facilitate the conduct of sustained interagency law enforcement operations from *January 1, 2014 through August 31, 2014* to dominate the Texas-Mexico Border area at points and times of its choosing and thereby deny criminal actions therein; provide a safe and secure environment where Texas citizens can prosper; contribute to the reduction of potential acts of terror within Texas and the United States; and promote regional stability.

The Kingsville Police Department as a member of the South Texas Sheriffs Coastal Alliance will be applying for overtime and fringe benefits as well as operational costs for fuel & maintenance to assist us in our target goals. Our City Attorney Courtney Alvarez has drafted a resolution in support of this project for consideration by our city commission. Please place this item on the next available City of Kingsville Commission agenda for consideration.

**Whereas**, the City passed and approved Guidelines and Criteria for Stimulating Economic Development within the City of Kingsville (EDA Guidelines) on January 28, 2013;

Whereas, a need for economic development, especially single-family residential development, exists within the City based on current demand and new job creation and the City desires to increase the amount of new residential single-family units built within the city, thereby increasing the sales tax and ad valorem tax base of the City to the benefit of citizens and other local taxing entities;

Whereas, the City believes providing economic incentives through this agreement with STBS will further its objectives of stimulating business and commercial activity through the expansion of the housing stock and tax base

# CITY OF KINGSVILLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT WITH SOUTH TEXAS BENEVOLENT SOCIETY FOR LAKE VIEW VILLAS

THIS ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is made and entered into by and between the City of Kingsville, a municipal corporation situated in Kleberg County, Texas (the "City) and South Texas Benevolent Society, LLC, a limited liability corporation created and operating in the State of Texas.

Whereas, the City passed and approved Guidelines and Criteria for Stimulating Economic Development within the City of Kingsville (EDA Guidelines) on January 28, 2013;

Whereas, a need for economic development, especially single-family residential development, exists within the City based on current demand and new job creation and the City desires to increase the amount of new residential single-family units built within the city, thereby increasing the sales tax and ad valorem tax base of the City to the benefit of other local taxing entities;

Whereas, the City believes the offering of local economic incentives will stimulate new residential single-family development within the city and stimulate economic activity and development within the city;

**Whereas,** additional single-family residential units will benefit the citizens, expand the tax base, and increase the population by capturing a larger share of the workforce that may be living elsewhere due to lack of adequate local housing stock:

Whereas, the City desires to approve qualifying applications for Economic Development Assistance to stimulate residential and economic development within the city as a local incentive to create additional housing, a higher level of employment, economic activity and stability within the City of Kingsville;

Whereas, the approved EDA Guidelines provide for the administration of a program that provides personnel and services and/or money of the city to promote local economic development and to stimulate business and commercial activity in the city, pursuant to authority found in section 380.001 of the Local Government Code;

Whereas, the City has received an application, pursuant to the EDA Guidelines, from Mark Dizdar on behalf of the South Texas Benevolent Society, LLC ("STBS") for monetary assistance for a residential subdivision to create 24 new garden homes each with a minimum square footage living space of 1,300 square feet and a two-car garage within "Lake View Villas";

**Whereas**, the City will be adopting Isabella Drive (a 36 foot wide roadway) and 2-12 foot wide parkways with sidewalks for a 60 foot City Right-of-Way;

**Whereas,** the City believes providing economic incentives through this agreement with STBS will further its objectives of stimulating business and commercial activity through the expansion of the housing stock and tax base.

**Therefore**, in consideration of the respective representations and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Authorization</u>. This Agreement is authorized by the Guidelines and Criteria for Stimulating Economic and Residential Development within the City of Kingsville pursuant to authority found in section 380.001 of the Texas Local Government Code. The City of Kingsville has determined that the request for Economic Development Assistance presented by STBS conforms with the criteria established in the EDA Guidelines.
- 2. <u>Defined Terms</u>. As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall have the meanings set forth below:
- A. "Certified Appraised Value" means the appraised value, for property tax purposes as certified by the Kleberg County Appraisal District.
- B. "Economic Incentives" means the total money incentive for infrastructure (water &/or sewer or street) that are to be located on real property within the city limits of the City of Kingsville, Texas for single family residential development purposes as designated in the EDA Guidelines.
- C. "Improvements" means the twenty-four (24) single family residential garden houses each with a minimum square footage of living space of 1,300 square feet and a two-car garage square feet within "Lake View Villas," and road construction which are all to be done by STBS in Lake View Villas, Kingsville, Texas.
- 3. <u>Administration Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall be administered by the Kingsville City Manager or his designee.
- 4. <u>Term.</u> Unless terminated earlier as provided elsewhere herein, this Agreement shall be effective after approval by the Kingsville City Commission and executed by both parties and shall run for a term not to exceed five (5) years from the date the last party signs this Agreement and provided the terms of the EDA Guidelines and the Agreement have been met, unless any extensions of up to five (5) additional years are granted by the City (not to exceed a total term of 10 consecutive years). If the completion of the project is delayed due to the fault of the City, then the Agreement term limit will be extended by an equivalent

amount of time as the City-caused delay. This Agreement is subject to early termination as per Section VII – Recapture of the EDA Guidelines.

- 5. <u>Economic Incentive</u>. The City of Kingsville and STBS agree and acknowledge that this Agreement shall provide for economic incentives, under the conditions set forth herein. For the duration of this agreement, the City will provide assistance with up to \$81,000 in economic incentives [through reimbursements of money (no more than \$81,000) equal to the M&O portion of the ad valorem city tax paid on real property covered by this agreement].
- 5.1 The reimbursement monetary incentives will be disbursed once each year on March 1st for the term of the agreement with payments to be equal to an amount of half of the generated M&O portion of city paid ad valorem taxes each year provided by the new homes constructed within the development area with the total cumulative incentives disbursed never to exceed \$81,000.
- 5.2. Reimbursement monetary incentives may also include up to an additional \$81,000 in economic incentives over time that is to be provided by Kleberg County, to be disbursed in the same manner as per the City's reimbursement monetary incentives, for infrastructure assistance pursuant to the City's Agreement with the County for economic development assistance.
- 5.4 All of the afore-mentioned economic incentives are subject to certain conditions. The conditions are that:
- (1) STBS will pay for compaction and core sample testing of the roads in Lake View Villas and STBS will provide all of the materials needed for infrastructure assistance,
- (2) The City Engineer will determine the location for all of the road testing done in Lake View Villas.
- (3) The City Engineer will be provided a copy of the core sample testing and compaction testing results,
- (4) The City Engineer must be satisfied that the subgrade and base meet the City's road construction standards before the any final overlay is placed on the roads in Lake View Villas.
- (5) Caliche base is allowed ONLY IF a geotechnical engineering report states the acceptable specifications for use of a caliche base, instead of the preferred limestone base, and those specifications are followed,
- (6) If the geotechnical report does not allow for a caliche base, or if the report does allow for a caliche base but the specifications are not followed, then in either case a limestone base will be used for roadways in the subdivision,
- (7) A homeowners association must be created to carry out the codes, covenants, and restrictions throughout the subdivision, which must include but not be limited to maintenance of the common areas, boulevard landscape/trees, and the detention pond. STBS shall be responsible for carrying out the codes, covenants, and restrictions until the homeowners association is established and is the owner of record of the common areas and detention pond. Codes, covenants, and restrictions shall be submitted to the City for review and approval prior to application for final plat and/or recording of the plat,
- (8) City will look into possible methods of ensuring conformance with maintenance of the common areas that are to be addressed in the codes.

covenants, and restrictions in the event the homeowners association fails to perform them,

- (9) Should Kleberg County decide not to participate in any economic incentives with STBS for the Lake View Villas subdivision, then the City will also not provide any incentives for the project,
- (10) STBS will construct and maintain a six foot (6") high privacy fence along the back and sides of the "Lake View Villas" development such that fence totally restricts visibility, AND
- (11) Isabella Drive (a 36 foot wide roadway) and 2-12 foot wide parkways with sidewalks for a 60 foot City Right-of-Way will be developed by STBS in Lake View Villas.
- 6. <u>Improvements.</u> STBS agrees to construct approximately twenty-four (24) single family houses each with a minimum square footage of living space of 1,300 square feet and a two-car garage square feet within "Lake View Villas" off of General Cavazos Blvd. in Kingsville, Texas during the term of this Agreement. The base year assessed value of the property for which economic incentives are sought is the valuation determined by the Kleberg County Appraisal District as of January 1, 2013. The improvements to be made are set out more fully in the Application for economic incentives.

#### 7. Representations.

- A. STBS represents and agrees that (i) it will have a taxable interest with respect to real property where the Improvements are to be made; and (ii) it will develop twenty-four (24) single family residential garden homes each with a minimum square footage of living space of 1,300 square feet and a two-car garage square feet within "Lake View Villasl" during the term of this Agreement.
- B. The City represents that (i) the EDA Guidelines have been created pursuant to authority in Chapter 380 of the Texas Local Government Code; and (ii) that the property where the Improvements are to be located is within the corporate limits of the City.
- C. STBS and the City each represent that no interest in Improvements is held or subleased by a member of the Kingsville City Commission or any employee or official of the City.
- D. STBS represents that all work to be done shall comply with all existing City of Kingsville codes and ordinances, and in compliance with state and federal laws.
- E. STBS represents that the appropriate permits and plans will be obtained prior to the beginning of any work.

- F. Ineligible property as described in Section IV, Subsection 4 of the EDA Guidelines is not subject to this Agreement.
- G. The City will provide economic incentives to the extent it has sufficient resources to do so.
- H. The estimated value of all the Improvements to be made is as per STBS's Application.
- 8. Access To and Inspection of Property by City Employees. STBS shall allow the City's employees access to the Improvements for the purpose of inspecting any Improvements erected to ensure that such Improvements are completed and maintained in accordance with the specifications and conditions of this Agreement and to ensure that all terms and conditions of this Agreement are being met. Such inspections may be made with one (1) or more representatives of STBS in accordance with all applicable safety standards.

#### 9. Default.

- A. The City Manager may declare a default hereunder if STBS (i) violates any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement or the EDA guidelines, including but not limited to Section XII Recapture; or (ii) allows any ad valorem taxes owed to the City to become delinquent and fails to timely and properly follow the legal procedures for their protest and contest. If the City Manager declares a default of this Agreement, this Agreement shall terminate as provided in Section VII Recapture of the EDA Guidelines and the City in such event, shall be entitled to recapture any economic incentives provided in this Agreement as per Section VII of the EDA Guidelines.
- B. The City Manager shall notify STBS of any default in writing in the manner prescribed in Section VII Recapture of the EDA Guidelines.
- C. The City and County shall be reimbursed through any means as necessary, as set out in Section VII of the EDA Guidelines.
- 10. <u>Compliance with State and Local Regulations</u>. Nothing in this Agreement shall be constructed to alter or affect the obligations of STBS to comply with any ordinance, rule, or regulation of the City or laws of the State of Texas.
- 11. <u>Assignment of Agreement</u>. This Agreement may be assigned only with the approval by resolution of the Kingsville City Commission, subject to the financial capacity of the assignee and provided that all conditions and obligations in this Agreement are guaranteed by the execution of a new Agreement with the City. No assignment shall be approved if the parties to this Agreement or the new owner are liable to any jurisdiction for outstanding taxes or other obligations.

The Kingsville City Commission shall not unreasonably withhold approval of an assignment.

12. <u>Notice</u>. All notices shall be in writing and mailed by certified or registered mail. Any notice of communications shall be deemed to be received three (3) days after the date of deposit in the United States mail. Unless otherwise provided in this Agreement, all notices shall be mailed to the following addresses:

13. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement along with any design standards attached hereto, the EDA Guidelines, the application submitted by STBS, along with any Subdivision Improvement Agreements that have been or may be entered into for the land covered by this agreement, contain the entire agreement among the parties and supersedes all other negotiations and agreements, whether written or oral.

**WHEREAS,** the City plans to hold a City General Election on May 10, 2014, in Kleberg County voting precincts for the purpose of electing a Mayor and four (4) City Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, the KISD Board of Trustees plans to hold a Board of Trustees Election on May 10, 2014, in Kleberg County voting precincts for the purpose of electing School Trustees to Place No. 1, Place No. 2, and Place No. 3;

WHEREAS, this agreement was enacted to reduce duplicitous services and expenses from having each entity provide the same services; and

WHEREAS, the School District and the City desire to share one-half of the cost of conducting the May 10, 2014 General Election for each of their entities; and

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Commission of the City of Kingsville, Texas:

**THAT** the City Manager is authorized and directed as an act of the City of Kingsville, Texas to enter into a Joint Election Agreement between the City of Kingsville and Kingsville Independent School District relating to the 2014 General Election in accordance with Exhibit A hereto attached and made a part hereof.

## JOINT ELECTION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF KINGSVILLE AND THE KINGSVILLE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT



This agreement is made and entered into this \_\_\_\_ day of December, 2013, between the City of Kingsville ("City") and the Kingsville independent School District ("KISD") to conduct a joint election.

#### I. JURISDICTION

The City plans to hold a City General Election on May 10, 2014, in Kleberg County voting precincts for the purpose of electing a Mayor and four (4) City Commissioners.

The KISD Board of Trustees plans to hold a Board of Trustees Election on May 10, 2014, in Kleberg County voting precincts for the purpose of electing School Trustees to Place No. 1, Place No. 2, and Place No. 3.

#### II. ADMINISTRATION

The City of Kingsville City Secretary/Elections Administrator agrees to coordinate, supervise and handle all aspects of administering the Joint Election in accordance with the provisions of the TEXAS ELECTION CODE as outlined in this agreement. The KISD agrees to pay the City for equipment, supplies, services and administrative costs as outlined in this agreement. The City of Kingsville Elections Administrator will serve as administrator for this election; however, each participating authority remains responsible for the lawful conduct of their respective election.

#### III. LEGAL DOCUMENTS

Each participating authority will be responsible for preparation, adoption and publication of all required election orders, resolutions, notices and any other pertinent documents required by their respective governing bodies.

If needed, the City of Kingsville will be responsible for making the submission required by the Federal Voting Rights of 1965, as amended, with regard to administration of the joint election. A copy of the submission will be furnished to the KISD. Any other changes which require preclearance by the U.S. Department of Justice will be the responsibility of each participating authority. Preparation of necessary bilingual materials for notices and preparation of the text for the official ballot will also be the responsibility of each participating authority.

#### IV. VOTING SYSTEM

Each participating authority agrees that voting at the election is expected to be of use of the iVotronic Voting System (Direct Recording Electronic {DRE}) equipment approved by the Secretary of State in accordance with the TEXAS ELECTION CODE. Electronic tabulating devices and equipment is expected to be used to tabulate the ballots. It is further agreed that the City will provide transfer cases for use during the early voting process and for use at each of the regular polling places located within the City on Election Day. Election Systems & Software is expected to be responsible for the parathion of programs and the Kleberg County Voter Registration Department is expected to be responsible for the testing of the iVotronic Voting System used for tabulating the ballots. Testing of the equipment is expected to be conducted at the Kleberg County Voter Registration Department, 700 Kleberg Avenue, Kingsville, Texas on May 7, 2014 at 1:00 p.m.

The City of Kingsville expects to lease iVotronic voting devices from Kleberg County for the election.

#### V. VOTING LOCATIONS

It is agreed by the participating authorities that early voting for the May 10, 2014 election will be held at the Kingsville City Hall, 200 E. Kleberg Avenue, Kingsville, Texas, 78363 and during four consecutive days at mobile voting sites to be designated in coordination with the KISD.

#### VI. ELECTION JUDGES, CLERKS AND OTHER ELECTION PERSONNEL.

The City will be responsible for the appointment of the presiding judge and alternate for each polling location, and also for the appointment of the Early Voting Ballot Board. It is agreed by the participating authorities to employ the number of election judges and clerks as the need determines, and that presiding election judges shall be paid \$12.00 per hour and the alternate judges and election clerks shall be paid \$10.00 per hour. The presiding election judge will receive an additional \$25.00 for picking up the election supplies prior to Election Day and for delivering returns and supplies to their designated drop-off site.

It is further agreed by the participating authorities to employ up to seven (7) early voting clerks, during the early voting period (April 28, 2014-May 6, 2014).

The City of Kingsville Elections Administrator is responsible for notifying all election judges of the eligibility requirements of Subchapter C of Chapter 32 of the TEXAS ELECTION CODE, and will take the necessary steps to ensure that all election judges appointed for the joint election are eligible to serve. The presiding judges, with

the Elections Administrator's assistance, will be responsible for ensuring the eligibility of each appointed clerk hired to assist the judge in the conduct of the election.

The City of Kingsville's Elections Administrator will conduct a training call for the election workers on the election laws and procedures. The instructional class will be held at KISD Administration Building, 207 N. 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Kingsville, Texas, on date(s) to be determined by the Kingsville Elections Administrator.

The election judges are responsible for picking up election supplies at the time and place determined by the Elections Administrator (which will be set forth in the election judge letter requesting service for this election).

#### VII. SUPPLIES AND PRINTING

The City of Kingsville Elections Administrator will arrange for all election supplies and election printing, including, but not limited to, all forms, signs and other materials used by the election judges at the voting locations.

The KISD will furnish to the City of Kingsville's Elections Administrator a list of candidates showing the order and the exact manner in which their names are to appear on the official ballot. This will be done as soon as possible after ballot positions have been determined by the KISD.

#### VIII. BALLOT TABULATION AND RETURNS OF ELECTION

The City will be responsible for the tabulation of ballots and the tabulation of early votes at the central counting station, Kleberg County Courthouse, 700 Kleberg Avenue, Kingsville, Texas. Following the tabulation of the ballots on Saturday, May 10, the KISD is responsible for obtaining the unofficial results from the Elections Administrator. The Elections Administrator will prepare the following election records to be returned to the KISD no later than 5:00 p.m. May 16, 2014: [1] precinct-by-precinct returns in early voting and on Election Day; and [2] copy of the Combination Form (Poll List/Signature Roster) from each polling location, and for early voting.

The KISD will be responsible for securing these records from the City by the date and time specified above.

#### IX. RECORDS OF ELECTION

Mary Valenzuela, City of Kingsville City Secretary/Elections Administrator, is hereby appointed general custodian of the voted ballots and all records of the Joint Election, as authorized by Section 271.010 of the TEXAS ELECTION CODE.

Access to the election records will be available to each participating authority as well as to the public, in accordance with the Texas Election Code, Texas Public Information Act, Chapter 552, GOVERNMENT CODE, at the City of Kingsville, City Clerk's Office, 200 Kleberg Avenue, at any time during normal business hours. The Elections Administrator shall ensure that the records are maintained in an orderly manner, so that records are clearly identifiable and retrievable per records storage container.

Records of the election will be retained and disposed of in accordance with the provisions of Title 6, Subtitle C, Chapters 201 through 205, TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE, including the minimum retention requirements established by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. If records of the election are involved in any pending election contest, investigation, litigation, or Texas Public Information Act, the Elections Administrator shall maintain the records until final resolution or until final judgment, whichever is applicable. It is the responsibility of any participating authority to bring to the attention of the Elections Administrator any notice of any pending election contest, investigation, litigation, or Texas Public Information Act request which may be filed with a participating authority.

On the first business day which follows the date that the records of the election are eligible for destruction, the Elections Administrator will notify in writing each participating authority of the planned destruction of any records of the election. Within fifteen days of the receipt of the Elections Administrator's notice of intent to destroy the records, each participating authority will provide the Elections Administrator with written authorization to proceed with destruction or written instructions to withhold destruction.

#### X. ELECTIONS EXPENSES

The participating authorities agree the costs of administering the May 10, 2014 election shall be born 50% by the KISD and 50% by the City. The KISD agrees to remit to the City of Kingsville, no later than April 25, 2014, a sum of \$10,000 to be allocated for part of their 50% of the total estimated cost of election expenses. Final election expenses will be determined within thirty (30) days after the canvass of the election returns, and the City will provide the KISD with a final accounting. It is agreed that the remaining balance owed will be remitted to the City no later than thirty (30) days after receipt of the final accounting.

In addition to payment of 50% of the election expenses, the KISD agrees:

- (1) No charges or expenses will be assessed by Kingsville Independent School District for janitorial services or HVAC expenses incurred by KISD on Election Day for school premises.
- (2) To pay the costs incurred for one person to assist the City Secretary during the Election preparation period of February 11, 2014 May 10, 2014. The KISD

shall provide an employee experienced in elections to assist during this period and absorb the cost of their salary and benefits. In the event the KISD does not provide such an employee, then the KISD agrees to pay the cost incurred by the City to hire an assistant who shall be paid an hourly rate not to exceed \$12.00 per hour, not to exceed 300 hours. The expense for this assistant shall not be included as an election expense in determining the 50%/50% division of expenses between the parties.

#### XI. EARLY VOTING

Mary Valenzuela, City Secretary, will be appointed as joint early voting clerk in compliance with Section 271.006 of the TEXAS ELECTION CODE. Other deputy early voting judges/clerks will be appointed as needed to process early voting mail and to conduct early voting at the main location and mobile sites. The City Secretary/Elections Administrator will designate two days of early voting as twelve-hour early voting days. The KISD will conduct four consecutive days of early voting utilizing its mobile voting sites, after coordination with the City Secretary/Elections Administrator.

Early voting by personal appearance will be conducted in accordance with the election order of the participating authorities.

All requests for early voting ballots by mail that are received by participating authorities will be delivered by the most efficient means on the day of receipt to the City of Kingsville, City Secretary's Office, 200 E. Kleberg Avenue, Kingsville, Texas 78363. Persons voting by mail will send their voted ballots to the City of Kingsville, City Secretary's Office, P.O. Box 1458, Kingsville, Texas 78364.

All early voting ballots will be prepared for counting by an Early Voting Ballot Board appointed in accordance with Chapter 87 of the TEXAS ELECTION CODE.

#### XII. CONTRACT WITHDRAWAL

Any participating authority that certifies their election in accordance with Section 2.051 2.052, and 2.053 of the TEXAS ELECTION CODE, may withdraw from the joint election contract. Any expenditure incurred prior to withdrawal shall be billed separately and that contracting authority shall be removed from the contract. In the event of election cancellation by the City, KISD agrees to conduct its election at its own expense.



AMENDING THE CITY OF KINGSVILLE CODE OF ORDINANCES BY AMENDING SECTION 9-10-7 PROVIDING FOR A CHANGE TO THE HEIGHT OF VEGETATION OVERHANGING STREETS AND PUBLIC PARKWAYS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND PUBLICATION.

**WHEREAS**, this Ordinance is necessary to protect the public safety, health, and welfare of the City of Kingsville.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF KINGSVILLE, TEXAS:

l.

**THAT** Section 9-10-7 of Article 10: Streets and Sidewalks of Chapter IX, General Regulations, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Kingsville, Texas, shall be amended to read as follows:

#### § 9-10-7 TREES AND SHRUBBERY.

(A) Definitions. For the purpose of this section, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

Alley. That narrow public way for the accommodation of the property it reaches which serves as a property dividing line within each block.


Parkways. All of that realty between the private property line and the public street line or boundary which belongs to the public or city by prescription, easement, dedication, deed or otherwise.


#### (B) Unlawful planting.

- (1) It shall be unlawful to plant, sow or otherwise cultivate plants, trees, hedges, shrubs or related things upon any alley within the city limits.
- (2) Hereafter it shall be unlawful to plant, sow or otherwise cultivate plants, trees, shrubs, hedges or related things in parkways in such a manner that will constitute a hazard to vehicles and passenger traffic by obstructing passage or vision. Particular attention will be paid to street intersections.
- (3) Trees, limbs, shrubs or other vegetation overhanging public parkways and streets shall be trimmed by the property owner concerned to the chief lewest the middle of the chief the street as follows:

(C) Obstructions to vision. All trees, shrubs, hedges or related things now in existence upon obstruction of passage or blocking of vision, are hereby declared to be public nuisances and will be abated by the adjoining property owner or in the alternative by employees of the city. All hedges or similar vision blocking vegetation within 30 feet of intersection will be abated or trimmed so as to eliminate vision obstruction to vehicle traffic. If the nuisance is abated by city employees the property owner will be billed for the labor, equipment and any disposal fees. Failure to pay for the abatement will result in a lien being filed against the property.
